- To enable students to develop a sound knowledge and understanding of a wide spectrum of relevant Humanities and Social Science approaches.
- To provide an opportunity for students to create links between different subject areas.
- To encourage awareness of and critical thinking about a range of social, political and cultural issues in a global context
- To enable students to develop their skills in written and verbal communication across multiple formats, analytical thinking, creative problem-solving, collection and classification of information, interpretation and evaluation.
- To equip students with the necessary transferable skills for lifelong learning and graduate employment in the context of changing labour markets.
- To equip students with employability skills which are embedded in modules and delivered through teaching and assessment methods focusing on 'real world' tasks such as writing blogs, collaborative group work and oral presentations.
- To provide students with the skills and the knowledge required to maximise career and postgraduate study opportunities by choosing relevant work placement and/or study abroad options.
